


## **Playgroup**

pre-school room where we pulled out some morning tea. We sat and ate together with our friends.








#### **House Points**

In Week 5 of Term 2 Goyder was ahead with 2250 points! In the lead for the term is Goyder with 45999 points!






#### **Class Points**


The class with the most points in Week 5 of Term 2 was....2 Riley-Smith with 335 points!!!




#### Lates

#### Classroom news — Transition McGrath

Transition McGrath have been learning about reading and spelling words. We are using the sounds we know to segment (sound-out) and then blend the sounds to read the words. Students love playing games to practice the sounds.

In the first two photos students are in a carousel (inside, outside circle). Students on the outside of the circle pretend to be teachers. They ask: What is the letter name? What is a sound it can make? Can you give me a word that starts with that sound? Students work their way around the carousel, then they swap over and have a turn to be the teacher. So much fun.

In the third photo students are learning to read words. They segment the word that our friend has on their headband. Then our friend will then try to use the sounds they hear to blend them together to guess the word they have. In this game we have lots of practice segmenting and blending sounds to read simple consonant, vowel, consonant words.

We love learning our sounds and how to read words in Transition McGrath.

# Sports Day—save the date


Our annual whole school sports day will take place on Friday 9th June.


# Pupil free day- Friday 23 June
