Children's University Australia aims to provide high-quality learning activities for children aged between 7 and 14 years, engaging the wider community as learning partners in this process. The Children's University is an initiative that has had great success in many parts of the world for its positive impact on the lives of young people. The program aims to foster confidence and self-belief, provide new experiences, enable the development of essential skills and to empower children to make informed and positive choices about their future. Students enrolled in Charles Darwin Children's University will be issued a 'Passport to Learning,' which records their learning journey.







In Week 6 of Term 2 Manton was ahead with 2302 points! In the lead for the term is Goyder with 48138 points!






Class Points






Lates

Laura and I recently attended the DSM workshop at the DMFS headquarters. Once a term DSMs from the Darwin and Palmerston area get together to share ideas, discuss trends and hear from guest speakers from local Defence Organisations.

This term Mali from the Darwin branch of Kookaburra Kids came along to inform us of their purpose and the new criteria for eligibility. They have now broadened their eligibility criteria for Defence families. The program is now open to any child, aged 8-18, of a current or former serving member. The Department of Veterans' Affairs is funding the Australian Kookaburra Kids Foundation to deliver the Defence Kids Program across Australia, which provides camps, activity days and age-appropriate mental health education focusing on coping skills and resilience, while allowing children to bond with peers who are facing similar challenges.

Book of the week: **Tiny Wonders** written and illustrated by Sally Soweol Han Tiny Wonders has been listed in the category of Book of the Year – New Illustrator for the Children's Book Council of Australia's Book of the Year Awards for 2023.



April thinks if her town was a colour, it would be grey. Everyone is too busy to stop and look around. How can she help them slow down? When she remembers the happiness that dandelions brought her grandmother, April comes up with a plan ... – Tiny Wonders

I am finding that the books I have been coming across and reading lately all reflect one or more of the Alawa School Values and ALLE's Tools. Tiny Wonders includes some of these such as Communication, Persistence, Pride and Personal Best. It is the story of a girl who has a dream and after talking to others in her community comes up with a plan to help people to slow down, connect with each other and bring colour and wonder back into the town and their lives. The illustrations take the reader on a visual journey using colour through a grey dreary town reflecting the busyness and self-absorption of the townspeople to the realisation of April's dream seeing people rediscovering the tiny wonders found in nature. The end of the book sees a double page spread of the meanings of different flowers. Did you know that Dandelions mean – Let's spread happiness.


