




Class Points

The class with the most points in Week 8 of Term 2 was....Transition Hughes with 176 points!!!






Lates

Book of the week: Wild Australian Life written by Leonard Cronin and illustrated by Chris Nixon

Wild Australian Life has been listed in the category of Book of the Year – Eve Pownall Award for the Children's Book Council of Australia's Book of the Year Awards for 2023.

More than one million animal species make their homes in Australia - from the deepest oceans to the tops of mountains and the harshest deserts. But just how do they survive? Discover the remarkable stories behind some of the world's most extraordinary animals. — Wild Australian Life

This book is a fascinating and educational look at Australian wildlife. It contains a wealth of interesting and unusual facts about many well known as well as less common animals. It includes labelled diagrams, information on habitats and behaviours and visual clues to help young readers to look out for signs of the animals in the environment. The text is presented in small chunks with colourful hand drawn illustrations presented in a different layout for each page. The text is suited to independent readers in upper primary but it is a wonderful book for reading together with your child and offers the opportunity to dip in and out of the information to a level they and you are comfortable with. I have certainly learned a lot in looking through this book and am looking forward to exploring it more with my son.

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the **Nationally Consistent Collection of Data** on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- · year of schooling
- · category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- · consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information.
